ARTICLE II OF THE INSTITUTE'S CONSTITUTION

- (1) The object for which the Institute is established is to promote by study, discussion, lectures, public addresses, the maintenance of an information service and by such other means as may be approved by the National Executive Council, an understanding of international questions and problems.
- (2) The Institute shall not express by resolution or in any other manner its opinion upon any aspect of any question or problem within the scope of this Article, and this limitation shall apply to and be binding upon the National Executive Council, hereinafter called the Council, and upon each Branch of the Institute that may be established under this Constitution.

REVIEW OF THE YEAR 1970

MEMBERSHIP

Total individual membership of the Institute was 854 at the end of the year, compared with 797 at the end of 1969. This was broken down among the Branches as follows: Cape Town 153; Eastern Province 30; Natal 43; Pretoria 40; Witwatersrand 557; and Country Members 31.

There were 43 Corporate Members of the Institute in 1970 and 4 major donors (see Annexure 4).

CONFERENCES

The Conference on "The Impact on International Relations of the Population Explosion" (referred to in the 1968 and 1969 Annual Reports) was held at Jan Smuts House from 24 June to 1 July, 1970. This was the first major conference to be organised by the Institute, and judging by the reaction of the many distinguished experts from overseas and the Republic who participated, it was a notable success. The Institute is most grateful to its Corporate Members and other South African Companies (76 in all), as well as a number of individual members, whose special financial support made this important undertaking possible.

A full list of the main speakers and of the topics considered at the Conference is given in Annexure 1. The papers presented are being published in a full report on the proceedings of the Conference, which will include the "Conclusions" adopted at the final session. The publishers are Macmillan (London).

Members of the Institute's Branches in Johannesburg, Durban, Port Elizabeth and Cape Town were fortunate to be able to hear addresses by some of the visiting participants from overseas at special evening meetings during their stay in South Africa.

PUBLICATIONS

The Institute sponsored the publication of <u>Smuts the Humanist</u> by T.J. Haarhoff (published by Basil Blackwell, Oxford), to mark the centenary of the birth of Jan Christiaan Smuts.

The main papers presented at the two-day Symposium held in October, 1969, on <u>United States Foreign Policy in a Regional Context</u>, were published by the Institute.

There were four issues of the Institute's Newsletter during the year. Apart from brief reports on African and world affairs, news from the Branches and lists of recent aquisitions to the Library at Jan Smuts House, a number of articles were included in the Newsletters. These articles are listed in Annexure 2, which also gives a list of occasional papers issued by the Institute during the year.

BRANCH ACTIVITIES

During the year there was a change in the Chairmanship of the Pretoria Branch. Mr. Leon Coetzee succeeded Professor M.H.H. Louw, who was appointed Smuts Professor of International Relations at the University of the Witwatersrand (as reported in the 1969 Annual Report).

A full list of the meetings held by various Branches of the Institute is given in Annexure 3. A wide variety of subjects was dealt with by many distinguished speakers both from South Africa and abroad.

The Director visited all the Branches of the Institute during the year, both to address meetings and to discuss the Institute's activities on a national and local level with the respective Branch Committees.

VISITORS

In October, 1970, Professor Jacques Freymond, Director of the Graduate Institute of International Studies in Geneva and Vice-President of the International Committee of the Red Cross, visited South Africa on the invitation of the Institute. He was accompanied by Mrs. Freymond.

Professor Freymond addressed meetings of all the Branches of the Institute, and met a wide cross-section of prominent South Africans.

A number of visitors from abroad attended discussion groups and other small meetings during the year, arranged by the Institute at Jan Smuts House to enable them to meet and exchange views with Institute members and other South Africans on foreign policy and related matters. The Institute is pleased that this function of Jan Smuts House - as a centre for the exchange of views with prominent visitors - has been developing very significantly.

LIBRARY

The Institute's Library in Jan Smuts House has continued to expand, both in the size of its collections on general international relations and on Africa, and in the use which is made of it by students and other interested persons in the Johannesburg area and wider afield. However, the use of the Library by Institute members - especially members of the Witwatersrand Branch, who have easy access to it - has continued to be disappointing.

DEPARTMENT OF INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS

Close co-operation has continued between the Institute and the Department of International Relations of the University of the Witwatersrand, which is also housed in Jan Smuts House. As recorded in the 1969 Annual Report, Professor Michael H.H. Louw was appointed to succeed Professor Ben Cockram

as Smuts Professor of International Relations, with effect from April 1970. Dr. Denis Worrall has been appointed as Senior Lecturer in the Department with effect from February 1971. Dr. Worrall was previously Senior Lecturer in the Department of Political Science of the University of South Africa.

This expansion of the Department of International Relations, which will contribute significantly to the further development of Jan Smuts House as a centre for international studies, is greatly welcomed by the Institute. It has been made possible by the generous financial assistance of the Smuts Memorial Trust and the Jan Smuts Memorial Committee, and it marks the fulfilment of hopes which both the University and the Institute have had for a number of years.

DR. H.J. VAN ECK

It is with great regret that we record the death in February, 1970, of Dr. Henry van Eck, a leading figure in South Africa for many years, and an Honorary Member of the Institute.

FINANCE

The Institute was pleased to welcome three South African Companies as new Corporate Members in 1970: Hill Samuel S.A. Ltd., the Trust Bank of Africa Ltd. and Unilever S.A. (Pty.) Ltd. A full list of Corporate Members and Donors is given in Annexure 4.

A grant towards the Institute's activities was received from the Smuts Memorial Trust, which was made possible by a grant-in-aid to the Trust by the City Council of Johannesburg.

The audited balance sheet and revenue and expenditure account for the financial year ended 30 June, 1970, are attached as an appendix to this Report.
